

CHAPLAIN'S CHAT

REVEREND NOEL OAKEY

When we engage in reading, I believe that we engage with someone else's imagination which can stir our own. We also engage in someone else's reality and views on life.



As a massive fan of "Star Wars," I became excited about the upcoming movie about the High Republic and "The Acolyte," so prepared myself by reading the first four books in the new series. That has led to me gradually reading through the novelization of all the movies, and the novels about the principal characters from the movies and series. My vision of Star Wars now has so much more clarity and dimension and I re-see the movies with different eyes.

Famed fantasy writer, Robert Jordan wrote a series of novels under the banner of "The Wheel of Time." Originally planned as a six-book series with the publication of "The Eye of the World" "in 1990, "The Wheel of Time" came to span 14 volumes, in addition to a prequel novel and three companion books.

The series draws on numerous elements of both European and Asian mythology, most notably the cyclical nature of time found in Buddhism and Hinduism; the metaphysical concepts of balance, duality, and a respect for nature found in Taoism; and the dualistic concepts of God and Satan. Jordan acknowledged the influence of J. R. R. Tolkien, including deliberately modelling the setting of the first chapters on the Shire in The Lord of the Rings.

The quote from the first book reads...

"At the dawn of time a deity known as the Creator forged the universe and the Wheel of Time, which spins the Pattern of the Ages using the lives of men and women as its threads. The Wheel has seven spokes, each representing an age, and it is rotated by the One Power, which flows from the True Source."

That is, the whole of existence and reality, past, present, and future, are spun from the lives of all by the Wheel. Figuratively speaking, everything repeats itself. <u>Fate</u> is an important theme to the series.

Two major themes are duty and balance. That is, living a good life well, in struggle, guided by hope, with trials, successes and failures, is beautiful.

The Wheel of Time has a theological landscape where all are free to do good or evil, and the goal of the Creator is to maintain that freedom, perhaps in the hope that people will choose good. The Wheel spins infinite worlds, and those that fall to the Dark One are picked out of the pattern.

An apt quote from the series is, "In the face of darkness, embrace the light within you," encapsulates the timeless wisdom of finding strength and hope in times of adversity.

Christians believe that God created us with free will. But He also gave us strong guidelines for living our lives well and to the fullest, creating supportive communities. Jesus demonstrated to us how God wishes us to live in a way that is timeless. That is, this way of life can be repeated again and again. At no time did God say that by embracing the Jesus inspired life that our lives would then be easy.

It would be a life guided by hope and purpose. A life that has embraced "the light." A light that is outworking and bringing that light to others, in a world that often only seems to be filled with darkness.

Safe Device use

At CGS, our students and teachers have a right to feel safe while teaching and learning in an inclusive environment, which includes digital and online spaces. For this to occur in our Primary section, student devices (iPads) must be used appropriately, efficiently, and supportively. Unfortunately, we have had to address the misuse of devices by a group of students, which compromised the safety of others.

To ensure that our students have support with safe digital practices at home and at school, please refer to your child's School Organiser for the expected School practices and discuss the following responsibilities with your child.

When I use digital technologies, I communicate respectfully by:

- Always thinking and checking that what I write or post is polite and respectful.
- Being kind to my friends and classmates and thinking about how the things I do or say online might make them feel (ask students to reflect on how they would feel).
- Not sending mean or bullying messages or forwarding them to other people.
- Creating and presenting my own work, and if I copy something online, letting my audience know by sharing the website link to acknowledge the creator.

When I use digital technologies, I respect myself and others by thinking about what I share online. This means I:

- Stop to think about what I post or share online.
- Use spaces or sites that are appropriate, and if I am not sure, I ask a trusted adult for help.
- Speak to a trusted adult if I see something that makes me feel upset or if I need help.
- Speak to a trusted adult if someone is unkind to me or if I know someone else is upset or scared.
- Don't deliberately search for something rude or violent.
- Turn off or close the screen if I see something I don't like and tell a trusted adult.

STUDENT LED CONFERENCES - LEARNING JOURNEYS (PRIMARY SCHOOL)

On Tuesday, 23 July, the CGS students will deliver their 'Student Led Conferences'. The conference meetings will commence at 3.30 p.m., and conclude at 6.00 p.m. On this day, students will attend and finish school at the usual time. However, students will need to be present at school for their personal student-led conference meeting times, after school hours.

What are SLC's?

Student Led Conferences provide opportunities for students to share evidence(s) of their learning journey. Consequently, during the conference, students explain their progress in some learning areas throughout the first semester, leading their families through an example of work with chosen learning experiences. At CGS, Student-Led Conferences are attended by the student and their parent/guardian, and other adults the student would like present.

These conferences are led predominantly by students; however, supported by teachers, being both class and specialist teachers. Each conference session may range up to a half hour; class and specialist teachers may both be involved in these conferences. Your child's teacher may have already or will send a BOOKING invite so you may select a session for your child to share their learning journey.



NAPLAN Results - Years 3 and 5

Our results in NAPLAN are an important measure of our students' educational growth because they tell us about our position of learning at both the national and the state level with measuring the critical literacy and numeracy skills of our students. For parents, NAPLAN provides information on how their child is performing against national standards, not just against other children in a class. For students, NAPLAN provides an opportunity for them to demonstrate what they have learned.

Please note that the school should receive the NAPLAN results soon. Individual NAPLAN results will be sent to the school first, then the school will send the individual reports to the appropriate families.

Semester Reports

Our Semester One reports provide information on your child's academic, personal, social, and emotional progress for Terms 1 and 2 of 2024. The left-hand side details work habits and attitude towards learning, while the right-hand side covers academic progress across the curriculum, reflecting all mandatory areas for Years 1-6 by the School Curriculum Standards Authority (SCSA).

Students are assessed through a combination of ongoing assessments, formal assessments, and teacher judgment based on what has been taught. This means a student might show an A standard in one semester and a C standard in another due to different concepts being assessed.

Your child's Semester 1 Reports will be shared through SEQTA via the Direct Messaging system in the first week of the school holidays. If you wish to discuss the report, please contact your child's teacher in the first week of Term Three.

INTERSCHOOL - WINTER LIGHNING CARNIVAL

Yesterday, Thursday 20 June, the Year 5 students competed in the Winter Lightning Carnival that was held at John XXIII College. The events included soccer, AFL, netball and hockey. FOSTERING STUDENT AGENCY

Once again, we wish to bring your attention to the opportunity of student agency which encourages our students to have 'more say' in their own learning. Student agency is an important aspect of our educational approach, allowing children to have a voice, choice and a relationship in/with their learning journeys. By fostering student agency, we encourage our students to become active participants in their learning process, promoting independence, responsibility, and more of a personal interest for learning.

What is Student Agency?

Student agency refers to the capacity of students to act independently and make their own choices about their learning. It involves setting personal goals, making decisions, and reflecting on their progress. When students have agency, they feel more engaged, motivated, and invested in their education.

How We Promote Student Agency at CGS:

- 1. Choice in Learning: We provide opportunities for students to describe and explain their knowledge and understanding in a variety of ways through open-ended tasks relating to expected learning.
- 2. Student Voice: We value student input in classroom decisions and learning, from selecting co-creating learning criteria and assessments, selecting reading materials; identifying how skill set can be shared; to designing classroom rules.
- 3. Self-Assessment: Students regularly assess their own work and progress, fostering a growth mindset and self-improvement.

Benefits of Student Agency:

- Increased Engagement: Students are more engaged when they have a say in their learning.
- Enhanced Motivation: Personal learning choice and goal setting boost intrinsic motivation.
- Development of Life Skills: Students learn critical thinking, problem-solving, and decisionmaking skills.
- Greater Responsibility: Taking charge of their learning promotes responsibility and accountability.





We encourage you to support student agency at home by discussing your child's goals, celebrating their achievements, and encouraging them to make decisions about their learning. You will see examples of student agency when you visit your child's Seesaw portfolio. Please encourage discussions with your child about the opportunities in deciding how a particular task was researched or presented. Together, we can help our students develop the agentic skills and the confidence they need for further independence in their learning.

Nijole Natalija Weedon Bursary

This bursary provides up to \$5,000 fee assistance for student fees per year to an indigenous or refugee student commencing at Court Grammar School in any of the Secondary School years 7-12. Further, the bursary seeks to provide for a child who would normally not be able to attend Court Grammar School and be able to pursue the academic opportunities available in the School.

Applicants are required to have an interview, with their family, conducted by the School Principal.

This bursary is offered to one (1) student for the duration of their secondary schooling and is not available to any other student until such time as the recipient graduates or leaves the School.

The continuation of this assistance is subject to acceptable academic achievement and positive contribution to the ethos of the school and is up to the discretion of the Principal. This is reviewed on an annual basis.

This scholarship is open to current Court Grammar School students as well as potential future students. Indigeneous Students in Year 6, 2024 can apply for 2025 entry.

ROLL CALL - BUS INFORMATION
