CHAPLAIN'S CHAT reverend noel oakey

Eric Liddle was born to Chinese missionaries in Tianjin China in 1902. At the age of 6 years old, he and his brother were sent to boarding school in South London. His parents did this with the understanding that they might not see their sons for the next 4-5 years except when they returned to Scotland on furlough.



Eric was an outstanding sportsman in both rugby and cricket. After finishing school, he enrolled in a BSc Degree in Pure Science. His sporting life continued and he represented Scotland seven times in rugby before retiring to concentrate on athletics.

Selected for the Paris Olympics of 1924, he discovered, on route to the games, that the heats for the 100m were to be held on a Sunday. A strong Christian, Eric withdrew from this event, as he felt he could not compromise his faith commitment. He entered the 200m and 400m.

He won Bronze in 200m and set a new world record in 400m.

At 22 years of age, Eric left fame and athletics to return to work as a science teacher and sports coach in China. He works tirelessly in isolated communities.

Eric remained in China through the turbulent years prior to and following the Japanese invasion. In 1945, at the age of 43, Eric Liddle died in a POW camp from a brain tumour.

Eric's decision to not run in the Olympic Games 100m was highlighted in the movie, "Chariots of Fire."

Eric's commitment to people has been reflected in his legacy.

The Eric Liddle Community, founded in 1980, is a caring organisation based in Edinburgh.

The organisation runs under the banner of Care/Compassion/ Community recognising the qualities that Eric Liddle demonstrated and worked so hard for, in his life. Standing up for high ideals is challenging in a world where values seem to be at times relative to the moment. But some values should never change, and that is valuing humanity... everyone is important. God sees everyone as important and any activity that says "we haven't turned a blind eye to what's going on here," has value for forming community- minded students. That is why events like the Anglicare Sleepout, in which I and 500 others participated in last week ,are valued.

Valued because they bring into the spotlight, people who feel forgotten.

As one homeless man said to me last week, while I was working in Emergency Relief at my church, "You people here make me feel welcome. Besides feeding me, letting me shower and wash my clothes, you give me time and space and listen to my story.

This is my haven every week."

Fidget Toys

At our school, we understand the importance of providing the right tools to support our students' learning and well-being. One such tool can be 'fidget toys', which, when used correctly, can help students focus and manage sensory needs. To ensure these tools are used effectively, please see the following guidelines.

Allocation and Purpose: Each student may have one fidget toy, selected with care to serve a specific and defined purpose. These fidgets are not just for fun—they are valuable tools for students with identified sensory needs. To ensure this, fidgets can only be provided if there is a documented learning issue in an Individual Education Plan (IEP) or Comprehensive Assessment Plan (CAP).

Criteria for Fidgets: To minimise distractions and ensure the effectiveness of these tools, we have specific criteria for fidgets:

- Size: Fidgets must be small enough to fit in the palm of your child's hand.
- Functionality: They should be silent and discreet to help maintain a focused learning environment.
- Personal Use: Each fidget is for the individual student's use only and should not be shared.
- Authenticity: Fidgets should be genuine sensory tools designed specifically for the purpose, e.g. calming and sensory regulation. They must not contain any loose particles or components that can lead to leakage.

By following these guidelines, we aim to create a calm and productive environment where every student can thrive. Thank you for your understanding and cooperation as we work together to support our community needs.



Digital Learning - WhatsApp and Snapchat

Alongside the many opportunities we offer at CGS for learning digitally, we have a BYOD programme (Bring Your Own Device) operating across the upper Primary levels. Students in these year levels require their own iPad to support and facilitate their learning. Unfortunately, some of our student's iPads contain APPs that are not suitable for our students under 12. For example, some students have WhatsApp and Snapchat on their iPads.

In Western Australia, the reasons for why students under 12 should not have WhatsApp and Snapchat are consistent with broader global concerns:

- Legal Age Restrictions: Our WA communities adhere to many global guidelines, including the age restrictions for WhatsApp and Snapchat, which are generally set at 13 years. These restrictions are designed to comply with laws like the Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA) and similar regulations that protect children's online privacy.
- Online Safety Concerns: As elsewhere around the world, there are significant concerns about online safety. Younger children may be more vulnerable to online predators, cyberbullying, and inappropriate content, which these platforms may expose them to. The Western Australian government and local authorities emphasise protecting children from these risks which is why age-restrictions for certain Apps are in place. While digital literacy is a growing focus in our schools, children under 12 may lack the critical thinking skills necessary to navigate social media platforms safely. The state's educational initiatives emphasise age-appropriate digital education, with a focus on safety and responsible use.
- Mental Health and Wellbeing: Western Australia has seen increasing attention to the mental health and wellbeing of young people. Social media use among younger children can lead to issues like anxiety, depression, and reduced self-esteem. The state's health and education sectors encourage activities that promote mental health rather than those that might detract from it.

If your child has WhatsApp or Snapchat on their iPads, we advise to chat with your child about their use.



CHAPLAIN NOAH BIOGRAPHY

I started at Court Anglican Grammar School as a Chaplain at the beginning of Term 3 this year. It has been a whirlwind start, and quite frankly a bit overwhelming. Finding my way around the school, getting to know the students, the teachers (as I was invited into classrooms), all staff and finding the most important building.....the canteen!

As a bit of background, after ordination in the Anglican Diocese of Perth in February 2023, I became an Assistant Priest at St Georges Cathedral in the city, which is where I have been since. Due to my passion for school chaplaincy the previous year I had completed a year-long internship as Chaplain at John Wollaston Anglican Community School.

My country of birth is Zimbabwe and I moved to Australia in 2003 to teach English at John Wilcock College in Geraldton. I later worked in South Hedland, Bunbury, and Perth.

After graduating with master's in Education, and a PhD in the Philosophy of Education (Applied Linguistics) I transitioned into academia, initially lecturing at Curtin University, then the University of Southern Queensland (USQ), returning to Curtin after three years in Toowoomba.



In response to a call to ministry in 2017 I enrolled and completed a Master of Theological Studies (MTS) at Murdoch University and a postgrad cert in Divinity (Grief, Loss and Suffering) from the University of Divinity in Melbourne. I am is married to Jabulile (Jabu), and we have a six-year-old son in year 1. By the grace of God I was also appointed the Priest-in-Charge at St Aidan's Anglican Parish in Byford as of the 1st of August. I look forward to my chaplaincy here at Court Grammar and to meeting all parents!

Students and staff thoroughly enjoyed this fabulous experience and are sure to remember it for a long time to come.






PRIMARY NEWS - INTERGRATED FRAMEWORK

Court Grammar School – Our Integrated Framework for 2025

In 2025, our Primary section is moving towards an inquiry orientated, integrated framework, based around the elements of the Western Australian's curricula. The following information will support you in learning how this framework works, how your child will connect with their learning and how you may assist.

Why integrate? The CGS Primary Framework is an integrated and inquiry-based program, connected to the conceptual understanding outlined in the models of learning and teaching found in the Western Australian Curriculum. This framework is supported by a strong understanding of how students learn. Within the framework, our students will have the opportunity to develop knowledge, conceptual understandings, skills and the dispositions of the CGS profile to make a positive difference in their own lives, their communities, and beyond.

CGS will implement the integrated framework to develop students' social academic. and emotional focusing wellbeing. on personal. community and global-mindedness and a sense of belonging, both locally and world-wide. The CGS framework nurtures independent and collaborative learners, encouraging every student to have voice, choice and relationship in their own learning.



How the CGS Framework Works - The CGS Framework is a multi-disciplinary curriculum framework that offers authentic learning experiences. It encourages students to learn to appreciate knowledge, conceptual understandings, skills and dispositions as a connected whole. Our Primary teaching staff collaboratively developed the integrated framework to promote the distinctive aspects of our school's community, which is organised and framed by six global themes connected to the overarching concepts found within the School Curriculum and Standards Authority:

- 1. Who We Are
- 2. Sustainability
- 3. Human Systems
- 4. Natural Systems
- 5. Place and Time
- 6. Communication, Creativity and Expression

These multi-disciplinary themes work together to provide students with authentic learning experiences that are not confined to the limitations of traditional subjects.

Although learning areas subject, e.g. HASS, Science, etc. still have central play in our learning, through the integrated model our CGS learners explore real-world problems by going beyond subject boundaries. Students have opportunities to reflect on the significance of their learning to take meaningful and personal action in their community and the wider world, through the opportunity of have a voice, a choice and a relationship with their learning.



How can parents help?

Firstly, engaging the families of our primary students, and getting them on board with their child's learning, is so important for all involved and for bringing that cohesion to our learning community.

Below are some tips to further enrich your child's learning with the Programme of Integration outside of the classroom and in your own home-space.



Take an inquiry stance

Meet a question with a question. Our first instinct when a child asks us a question is to provide an answer. This approach can prevent the opportunity to have learners not only learn the information explored, but also learn something about how to learn. So next time your child asks you a question ("How do you spell?" "How do you multiply fractions?" "What are the types of energy?"), instead of supplying the answer, try responding with a question:

> Great question! How could you find that out? What resource could you use to discover that? How could you figure that out?

Don't feel you have to be an expert, just be a learner with your child

It is okay to not know something. In fact, that presents an amazing opportunity to model your own approaches to thinking and learning. Give yourself the grace to say, "I don't know" or, "I have no idea". Then follow it up with, "But now I want to know, so here is how I am going to find out!" or, "Let's figure this out together!

Prioritise Reflection

Let's encourage our students to 'think about their thinking'. There are two basic questions you may ask your child to help them think deeper about their learning in any learning area. These two questions can support learners to think about their learning which may lead to a deeper understanding:

How do you know? What makes you say that?

Support your child's agency

Promote VOICE with your child. Offer your child space to articulate what they like and don't like about learning, and why that is. Listen to when they are advocating for what they need as learners. Communicate with your child's teacher and together, find ways to support your child's suggestions on how they may best learn.

Coach your child to make informed CHOICES with their learning, by making the decision-making process explicit, e.g., What choice are you making for yourself? Then follow up with a reflection about how effective that choice was and whether it's a good choice to be made again in the future, e.g., How did that choice work out for you? How do you know? What will you choose differently next time?

Push to develop your child's RELATIONSHIP with their learning. We want our students to know it's their learning, they own the process, and they impact how their learning is used. We are only the supporting actors on their 'learning stage'. Use words and phrases that build that sense of relationship for their learning:

It's your learning. You're in the driver's seat. Your learning, your choice.


4H Miss Hall – 'How to Train Your Dragon'


MATHS WEEK


